
Profile of IENs Registered in Newfoundland & Labrador (April 1, 2023 - March 31, 2024)

- Internationally Educated Nurses (IENs) are RNs who receive their basic nursing education outside of Canada. In the 2023-24 licensure year, there were 7,702 RNs with a practicing license. Of these, 529 (6.9%) were internationally educated. This represents a 456% increase compared to five years ago.
- In 2023-24, seven-out-of-10 IENs (71.4%) were newly licensed in NL, most of these (71.9%) were also registered in another Canadian jurisdiction.
- Just over half of IENs (55.6%) reported an address within NL. The remaining 38.2 % had an address in another Canadian province and 6.2% were outside Canada.

IEN Applications



- In the 2023-24 licensure year there were 580 complete applications from IENs. This represents an increase of over 700% compared to the previous licensure year.
- College staff completed reviews of 721 IEN applications.¹ The outcomes were as follows:

Country of Education


In 2023-24 the majority of IENs with a practicing license were educated in the Philippines (43.3%), India (29.3%), Nigeria (6.4%), United States (5.1%) and United Kingdom (2.5%).

Employment²

- Most IENs reported that their primary employer was in NL (47.3%), with the majority employed by NL Health Services (38.2%). Another 39.9% reported that their primary employer was outside NL³ and approximately one-in-eight (12.9%) reported that they were not currently employed in nursing.
- The vast majority of IENs who reported having an NL employer (n=250) were employed full-time (90.0%) and most were in staff nurse positions (80.4%).
- IENs worked primarily in long-term care (46.0%), hospitals (34.4%), and community health/health centres (7.2%).

³ This could include IENs who were employed as travel nurses, those providing care from another jurisdiction through telehealth, and those who were relocating to NL but had not yet updated their employment information.
